Guidance notes on seven-minute briefings

Purpose of a seven-minute briefing

Seven-minute briefings are based on research which suggests that seven minutes is an ideal time span in which to both concentrate and learn.

Learning for seven minutes is manageable in most settings, and learning is more memorable if it is simple and not clouded by other issues and pressures.

Origin of Lead Safeguarding Briefing and Delegated Safeguarding Briefing

This briefing originated from revisions to Working Together to Safeguard Children 2023, with the intention of strengthening the accountability of statutory partners. Chapter one, within Working Together 2023, clarifies the roles and responsibilities of safeguarding partners, and how they work together. The changes describe a shared and equal leadership responsibility across statutory agencies, ensuring leaders are accountable for their services to safeguard and promote the welfare of children and young people.

The purpose of this briefing is to describe to police leaders their key responsibilities within both policing, and the safeguarding partnerships. The aim is to encourage leaders to think about how they might create an environment which fosters an effective multi-agency, child safeguarding leadership team.
